

Alexandros Nafpliotis

Alexandros Nafpliotis holds a PhD in International History from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE). He studied English Language and Literature at the University of Athens, and History and International Relations at the LSE. He was previously a Research Associate at the Hellenic Foundation for European & Foreign Policy (ELIAMEP) and the National Hellenic Research Foundation, a Visiting Fellow at the Hellenic Observatory at LSE, and has also worked as an Attaché at the High Commission of the Republic of Cyprus in the UK, as well as for the Council of the European Union in Brussels and the Army History Directorate in Greece. More recently, he conducted research on contemporary European history at Maastricht University and the University of Luxembourg. His first book, *Britain and the Greek Colonels: Accommodating the junta in the Cold War*, examines diplomatic, economic, cultural, and defence relations between subsequent British governments and the junta. He has presented his research at conferences and seminars in Europe and the US, and has won a dissertation prize from the London Hellenic Society. Alexandros has taught on various aspects of twentieth century international history at the LSE for a number of years. His research interests lie in the field of contemporary European history.
